Sponsors' Women's Program is Family-Focused

As a Sponsors partner, you may know that Sponsors provides wraparound services—including transitional housing, job search assistance, case management, and mentorship—to both men and women. Sponsors' services for women with criminal histories, however, are specifically designed to meet women's unique needs. One of the key features of Sponsors' Women's Program is the broad support provided to women with children.

Many women reentering the community are mothers who have been separated from their children. Outcomes for women who leave prison are much better when they are reunited with their children and can live in a structured learning environment.

Furthermore, children of incarcerated mothers face unique challenges after their mothers leave prison, and typically respond better when they are able to stay with their mothers.

Sponsors began providing dedicated transitional housing for women in 2001, and expanded in 2013 with the addition of the **Reunite in a Supportive** Environment (RISE) program. Housed in Bothy Cottage on the Downtown Campus, the RISE program can serve five women and their children at a time. Bothy Cottage is more than just a building with beds-it is a warm, inviting, and secure home, with outdoor and indoor play areas for children. Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT) classes offering individual and community support are open to Women's Program residents and local area women with criminal histories. Parenting education, available in both the Men's and Women's Programs, helps participants strengthen parenting skills and have healthier families. Women reuniting with their children after incarceration generally reside with their children for up to a year at Bothy Cottage.

Sponsors' innovative Women's Program offers a supportive environment where individuals and families can grow and thrive together to succeed.

FROM THE DIRECTOR

As the season changes and the autumn leaves tumble, I am reminded of the changes that Sponsors participants make as they engage in the daunting task of reentering the community.

Sponsors' programs require participants to change more in 60 days than many people change in a lifetime. Like bright green leaves bursting forth in spring, they are starting anew. We help program participants establish their roots in fertile soil by providing them with the resources and supports they need.

With The Oaks at 14th fully occupied, we are witnessing the profound impact of permanent supportive housing on the lives of people with criminal histories. The housing crisis in our community is real, however, and providing affordable housing options for the hundreds of men and women who successfully complete our programs each year remains a challenge. To meet the growing need, Sponsors is embarking on a new, exciting housing project.

With your help, we plan to build a tiny home community that will include 10-12 tiny houses, a community garden, and a community center. The project will be on property we own behind our Roosevelt Crossing facility on Hwy 99.

I am incredibly grateful for the many ways you support our work. You allow us to fertilize the soil and cultivate growth for returning individuals. Because of your support, our community thrives. Thank you for all you do.

Men's Program: A Team Effort Leads to Successful Reentry

The Men's Transitional Housing Program offers a variety of services designed to meet the many needs of participants struggling with the challenges of reentering our community. Starting with a warm welcome and clean, safe housing upon arrival, additional programs include specialized counseling strategies such as Moral Reconation Therapy, Motivational Enhancement Therapy, and Parenting Inside / Out. On-site parole officers offer additional support. Job assistance is provided at our Reentry Resource Center, and mentors are available through the Mentorship Program. The Men's Case Management team is at the heart of all the services in the Men's Program, and the staff brings a wealth of knowledge, training, and experience.

This is an exciting time for Sponsors' Men's Program! Our staff is committed to continue building the long legacy of providing quality reentry services to change lives and make our community a safer place to live.
